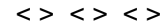
There is no Crafty Saturday in December. Everyone is too busy getting ready for Christmas.

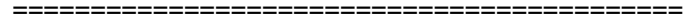

**Christmas Charity**

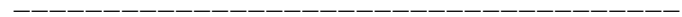

We have a lot of NEW members who maybe don't understand what goes on at **SHOW TIME**. Let me explain:

**Early Friday morning we mark out the floor** - where each dealer is going to be as well as the information, fish pond, silent auction and show cases. Once the cases are emptied they need to be folded and stacked, skirting needs to be rolled, light bulbs and light brackets put back in their respective boxes and then **EVERYTHING** trundled out to the storage room and put away until next year.

That is why we need some of you **younger** members to join the committee and find out how things are done. It's time a few of us **old foggies** retire and let the younger generation look after things.

Mineral of the Month

**Auricupride Cu<sub>3</sub>Au**

**Tetraauricupride AuCu**

Continuing with our theme of gold and minerals containing gold, this month's article will describe two rare minerals that are essentially an alloy of **copper (Cu)** and **gold (Au)**.

**Auricupride** is a gold-copper alloy that may contain 7-9% Palladium (Pd). Crystallizing in the cubic system, this mineral occurs as yellow grains with a violet or reddish tint when fresh, tarnishing in a few days to brown. The specific gravity is less than gold, but still quite high at 12.2. Known localities for this mineral include the Zolotaya Gora deposit, Karabash, southern Ural Mountains in Russia (the type locality) and at Stupna, near Nova Paka, Bohemia, Czech Republic. This mineral was previously called **cuproauride**.

**Tetraauricupride** occurs as irregular grains to 0.6 mm, golden yellow in colour, with strong metallic luster. Crystal system is tetragonal, hardness 4.5 and Specific Gravity = 14.67. This mineral occurs in basic and ultrabasic rocks with magnetite, chromite, gold and other common sulphides near Sardala, Marneshi district, Xinjiang Uygur autonomous region, China. In Colorado, USA, it is found with the mineral roscoelite  $KV_2 AlSi_3O_{10} (OH)_2$  at Bedrock, Paradox Valley, Montrose County. In the Konder massif, Khabarovsk kray, Russia it covers platinum crystals. In Switzerland it was found with gold in a brook named Rio de Misery, Fribourg canton.

These minerals are extremely rare. Specimens are available from rare mineral dealers, if you are lucky. At the time of writing (early November/09) I found some sources on the internet, but supplies are expected to be limited and prices vary. In researching this series of minerals containing gold, the total number of minerals represented is less than a couple of dozen. For a collector who wishes to specialize in rare minerals, assembling a complete collection of gold bearing minerals would be a challenging, but achievable pursuit.

Stay tuned to this column for more gold bearing minerals over the next few months

## HOW GEOLOGIC TIME PERIODS GOT THOSE CRAZY NAMES

the three geologic eras are the **Paleozoic**, **Mesozoic**, and **Cenozoic** - from the Greek for **Ancient**, **Middle** and **Recent Life**. They are divided into 11 periods, most of them named for the places where rocks from that period were first discovered.

The **Cambrian Period** (50 - 500 million years ago) is named for Cambria or Wales. The next two periods also received Welsh names: **Ordovician** and **silurian** for two Welsh tribes, the Ordovicians and Silurians.

The **Devonian** is named for Devonshire, England and the **Cretaceous** comes from "**creta**" Latin for Chalk, referring to the White Cliffs of Dover, England.

The **Jurassic** is named for the Jura Mountains in Germany, and the **Permian** for the Perm in Russia's Ural Mountains.

The **Triassic** got its name because it was easily divisible into three parts and the **Carboniferous** is named for carbon, because most coal deposits date from that

*(note by The Pterodactyl Editor: In North America, the Carboniferous is subdivided into the Mississippian, named for the Mississippi River and the Pennsylvanian, named for the coal deposits first discovered in Pennsylvania)*

The most recent periods are the **Tertiary** and the Quaternary, named for types of rock dated to those eras. They are divided into epochs, whose names all end in "cene" a Greek root meaning recent.

**Pleistocene** is from the Greek for most recent. Preceding it are the **Pliocene**, **Miocene**, **Oligocene**, **Eocene** and **Paleocene**, meaning most recent, less recent, little recent, early recent and oldest recent. Got it all now ?
